A. STATUS AND SCOPE OF THE POLICY BEING ASSESSED

For the purposes of this assessment, the term 'Policy' refers to a Policy, Strategy, Programme, Procedure, Function or Decision.

A1. What are main aims, objectives, purpose and intended outcomes of the Policy?

The purpose of Supplementary Planning Documents (SPD) is to expand on policies set out in the Local Plan and to provide additional detail. The draft Sawston Village Design Guide SPD expands on Policy HQ/1: High Quality Design as well as other policies contained within the adopted South Cambridgeshire Local Plan 2018.

South Cambridgeshire is a high growth area, experiencing unprecedented planning applications within, on the edges of, and beyond established villages, which are varied in size, scale, settlement pattern and character. The Local Plan seeks to “shape development of all scales, be that small scale rural housing to major new communities, to create sustainable and successful places that protect the special qualities of the district’s rural character, whilst using the opportunities presented by development to enhance the built and natural environment, and create vibrant communities.”

The Sawston Village Design Guide SPD includes detailed analysis of the distinctive character of the village, and identifies guidance points that should be used to inform development, relating to a number of key themes and priorities of the village communities.

The aims of the Village Design Statement initiative are to:

- Reinforce local distinctiveness, leading to high quality environments for local communities, benefitting quality of life for residents.
- Increase the sense of ownership from Parish Councils and local communities about the changes taking place in their village/community either through neighbourhood planning or as a result of planning permissions for new developments.
- Give more weight to design quality when determining planning applications through reference to the adopted Village Design Guide SPD.
- Upskill local communities in understanding the qualities and characteristics of places, planning and design issues, giving parishes and community members more confidence in how they can shape positive outcomes from new developments by proactively engaging with the planning process.
- Develop a toolkit for producing Village Design Guides using tried and tested methodologies, in a time and cost efficient process.
- Reduce uncertainty in the development process for applicants and create greater clarity around local distinctiveness and character, to help shape design discussions at pre-application and reserved matters planning application stages.

A2. What is the status of this Policy? (New, existing or under review)

The Sawston Village Design Guide will be a new Supplementary Planning Document and is currently in draft form pending the outcome of formal consultation.

A3. What is the timescale and decision-making route for approval of the Policy?

The draft Sawston Village Design Guide will be recommended to Cabinet in April 2019 for approval to undertake a six week statutory public consultation. The six week consultation will be open to a range of external stakeholders including the general public and during the consultation the draft Sawston Village Design Statement and supporting documents will be available to view on SCDC's website. A one day exhibition will also be held in the village itself, and paper copies will be available to view at SCDC's offices.

Following the consultation period, the representations received will be reviewed and amendments will be made to the Sawston Village Design Guide where necessary. The Sawston Village Design Guide will be recommended to Cabinet in Autumn 2019 for adoption. A Consultation Statement will be produced to detail the representations received and the subsequent amendments proposed to the draft SPD before it is adopted.

A4. Is this policy associated with the Council's strategic Aims, Approaches and Actions (The Three 'A's')? If so, please state the relevance and association to The Three 'A's'.

The Sawston Village Design Guide addresses the following strategic aims of the Council:

Aim 1 – Living Well. Support our communities to remain in good health whilst continuing to protect the natural and built environment.

The Sawston Village Design Guide will help to ensure that Sawston is a healthy, safe and attractive place to live through safeguarding its distinctive and locally valued character.

Aim 2 – Homes for our Future. Secure the delivery of a wide range of housing to meet the needs of existing and future communities

The Sawston Village Design Guide will facilitate higher quality development proposals which are more acceptable to the local community and more compliant with the adopted design policy in the South Cambridgeshire Local Plan 2018. This will help to increase the certainty and speed of planning decision making in the District.

A5. Who are the intended beneficiaries/stakeholders of the policy or function? How many people are affected and from what sections of the community?

The draft Sawston Village Design Guide SPD has been prepared to provide a clear understanding of the distinctive character and local qualities of Sawston which it is desirable to protect and enhance, to inform decision making related to development proposals within the village.

The beneficiaries and stakeholders of the Sawston Village Design Guide are:

- Village residents, in benefitting from new development that better addresses their priorities.
- Parish councils and Neighbourhood Plan groups, in having more tools and capacity to assess and engage with the development of key sites.
- Developers, property owners and their designers, in considering potential development proposals.
- Development Management officers in the assessing of and determination of planning applications.
- Statutory and non-statutory consultees, including parish councils and members of the public, in commenting on planning applications.

A6. Are external partners involved in delivering this policy? If so, what are their roles, and level of involvement/influence?

The draft Sawston Village Design Guide has been developed by external consultants appointed to undertake the work on behalf of the Council, working with village communities and SCDC.Policy, Built and Natural Environment and Development Management teams

B. EVIDENCE, DATA AND CONSULTATION

The draft Sawston Village Design Guide SPD is only concerned with the development of land, therefore it only directly relate to land uses and not the people living on the site. Monitoring Indicators set out in the South Cambridgeshire Local Plan 2018 will help review the success of the SPD. The County Council Research Group provide a break down of Census information in district and ward level profiles. This includes useful information on Gender, Age, Race, Disability, and Religion / Faith.

B2. Have you compared the data you have with the equality profile of the local population? What does it show?

The draft Sawston Village Design Guide SPD is only concerned with the development of land, therefore it only directly relate to land uses and not the people living on the site.

B3. Have you identified any improvements or other changes that could be made from monitoring the data?

The draft Sawston Village Design Guide SPD should assist with the delivery of the highest quality sustainable development, taking into account local opinions expressed through the development of the SPD and the public consultation exercise. Local people, including residents, will continue to have the opportunity to share their experience and help to shape the place in which they live and work.

B4. Have you consulted or involved external stakeholders about the policy or function? If so, what were their views?

The draft Sawston Village Design Guide SPD was developed with the involvement of community members from the village, including representatives from the Parish Council. The draft Sawston Village Design Guide SPD will be subject to a six week period of public consultation with a range of external stakeholders. A list of consultees is included in the Consultation Statement which accompanies the SPD. During the consultation the draft Sawston Village Design Guide SPD will be available on SCDC's website. A one day exhibition will also be held in the village itself, and paper copies will be available to view at SCDC's offices. A Consultation Statement will be produced and will detail the representations received and any subsequent amendments proposed to the draft SPD before it is adopted.

B5. Have you undertaken any consultation with staff to assess their perception of any impacts of the policy or function? If so, what has been learnt from them?

The draft Sawston Village Design Guide has been developed with the oversight of a Project Board at SCDC bringing together representatives of the different teams within Planning, including Natural and Built Environment, Planning Policy and Development Management. The draft Village Design Statement has been reviewed by staff from these teams and their feedback has been incorporated into the SPD. A summary of the feedback is included in the Consultation Statement which accompanies the SPD.

B6. Please provide information about any other consultation, research, or involvement undertaken in relation to this impact assessment.

The draft Sawston Village Design Guide SPD will be published for a six week public consultation, as detailed in B4 above. Consultation will accord with the Council's Statement of Community Involvement. A list of consultees is included in the Consultation Statement which accompanies the SPD.
