resolve your enquiry as quickly as possible

County Council and Mayoral elections in May 2025

Elections for a Mayor of Cambridgeshire and Peterborough will be held on 1 May alongside elections for Cambridgeshire County Council. To take part in these elections you must be registered to vote. You are less likely to be registered if you have recently moved house or turned 18. You can find more information about registering to vote on our website at www.scambs.gov.uk/elections

To vote you will need to bring valid photo ID. A full list of acceptable documents can be found on our website. You can also find more information about how to apply for a voter authority certificate, a special form of ID which you can use for voting.

Remember, if you are going to be away on polling day you can apply online to vote by post or proxy. All the information is on our website.

Thank you for recycling cables

In October 2024, we rolled out special bins to some libraries and community hubs as part of The Great Cable Challenge; a national campaign aiming to collect one million cables or chargers for recycling in one month. Cables contain valuable resources like copper, which are needed for industries such as expanding the UK's wind and solar energy generation. Copper production is struggling to meet demand, so clearing out unused cables is an important way to bolster supply. With your help we collected more than 2,000 extra cables which can now be given a second life. Thank you!

In October 2024, we welcomed four care leavers to participate in a work experience placement at South Cambridgeshire Hall. A care leaver is a young person who has been in the care of the local authority and is transitioning to independent living. We aim to support these young adults by providing valuable skills and insights into potential career paths.

The young adults spent time with various teams, including Planning, Communications, Climate and Environment, and Economic Development, gaining a real taste of the range of careers available in local government.

We received overwhelmingly positive feedback, and the participants commented on how the experience boosted their confidence and how much they enjoyed being in a workplace environment. Climate and environment: Don't go with the flow!

Top tips to take control of your water use

How often do you think about water? You may be surprised to know we're using more of it than ever before. According to Cambridge Water, we each use 143 litres a day.

The water that comes out of our taps in South Cambridgeshire is drawn from the natural underground storage which also supplies our rivers and chalk streams and is only replenished by rainfall. High demand for water, especially in times of low rainfall, risks drying out our chalk streams and putting these nationally important habitats at risk. Read more about these precious waterways below.

Although there are plans to relieve stress on water supply in the area, environmental groups warn that to adapt to the pressures of climate change and a growing population, we must all build good habits and reduce our water use at home. You'll be protecting our environment and could save money on your water bill!

Top tips for reducing water use

- Take short showers instead of baths. You can also switch to a water-saving shower head that aerates the flow of water for a better soak!
- If your toilet has a dual flush, remember to use the smaller one. If not, you could install
 devices like Hippo the Water Saver and reduce your flush by litres.
- Don't leave taps running while you brush your teeth, or while you're soaping your hands.
 Similarly, turn off the shower while shampooing your hair.
- Use your dish washer on the eco setting and only rinse items that really need it.
- Take advantage of Cambridge Water's GetWaterFit, an interactive online tool that provides advice and lets you order free water-saving products. Visit www.cambridge-water.co.uk/saving-water
- If your water supply is not metered, consider applying to have a free smart meter installed. This gives an incentive to use less water and might save you money.
- Collect and recycle rainwater where possible, especially for use in the garden. Invest in a
 water butt with drain downpipe connectors so you can water plants with rainwater. To install
 water butts in community buildings, local groups can access our Community Chest Grants.

Climate and environment: Protect your local chalk streams

Chalk streams are rare and valuable water courses that shelter unique plants and animals.

They are nationally important as around 85% of the world's chalk streams are in England, with many of these in East Anglia. In South Cambridgeshire and Cambridge, we are lucky to have at least 17 main chalk streams, focussed in the area known as the Cam Valley.

Chalk streams emerge from water springs in chalk bedrock, called the chalk aquifer. As water moves through this chalk, it is cleaned naturally, creating beautiful clear streams that support a unique array of wildlife.

Healthy chalk streams are home to iconic species like brown trout, otters, water voles and kingfishers, rare insects like the winterbourne stonefly, and plants like stream water crowfoot.

What's the problem?

Many chalk streams are in poor condition, suffering from several threats.

- Pollution, sewage and erosion can damage water quality, degrading the chalk stream environment for the plants and animals that live there.
- Water is taken from the chalk aquifer to supply homes, farms and businesses. This is called abstraction. When water is taken from the chalk aquifer faster than it naturally restores,

chalk streams can be damaged or can dry up completely. This is called over-abstraction.

 Invasive non-native species like American signal crayfish can also upset the streams' delicate natural balance.

How can you help?

- You can help chalk streams in our area by reducing your water use, to ease the demand on the aquifer. We have put together our top water saving tips on the previous page.
- Get involved in looking after chalk streams and nature in your local area. Contact your local Parish Council to find out if there is a local nature group near you.
- Report pollution in chalk streams and other watercourses to Anglian Water on 03457 145 145 or anglianwater.co.uk/tell-us
- · As spring arrives, it's a good time to visit some chalk streams for yourself.

Here's some of the examples in South Cambridgeshire with public access:

- The River Granta can be found in Babraham, Linton, Great Abington and Hildersham via public footpaths and in village recreation grounds.
- The River Mel near Meldreth and Melbourn has a footpath for much of its length and can be accessed at public playing fields.
- The River Shep has a footpath along the majority of its course and takes in Shepreth village centre.

Cllr Brian Milnes, our Lead Cabinet Member for Environment, said:

"Chalk streams are one of the rarest freshwater ecosystems in the world, with around 85% of them found in the UK. Their rarity makes them vital habitats, supporting diverse wildlife. These streams also play key roles in flood regulation, nutrient cycling and maintaining clean water supplies, making their protection crucial for both biodiversity and the essential services they provide."

Climate and environment: Maximise home energy efficiency with Action on Energy

Action on Energy is a partnership of local councils that provides communities with advice and support for maximising home energy efficiency.

The partnership aims to save you money on your energy bills and reduce your carbon emissions through providing funding opportunities and retrofit-focused guidance and resources.

For the last two years we have delivered improvements to homes through the Home Upgrade Grant 2, funded by the UK Government, which is now closed for applications.

We have provided more than 75 properties with a variety of insulation and clean heat installations in South Cambridgeshire alone. These installations aim to make it easier and less expensive to keep homes at a comfortable temperature year round.

We visited several properties as part of an audit for the Home Upgrade Grant 2, and each resident described the improvements as positively impacting their bill savings and comfort.

One resident said:

"Thank you, and to the Action on Energy team, for helping me to acquire the new heating system. It really has changed my life on a day-to-day basis and is appreciated much more than you could ever know."

Following the success of this scheme, we will continue to seek funding opportunities to support further energy efficiency upgrades to homes.

Your Council: Four-day week consultation

Up until the end of the day on Sunday 23 March, you can share your views on the services you've received from us during our four-day week trial.

An eight-week public consultation got underway at the end of January. It has been designed so residents, businesses, town and parish councils and community or voluntary groups can share views on how they have found Council services since January 2023 – when our trial of a four-day week began. The information gathered during the consultation will help our District Councillors decide on the next steps for the four-day week at the Council.

We announced plans to trial a fourday week – where people deliver 100% of their work, in around 80% of their contracted hours, for 100% of their pay – to help address acute recruitment and retention issues.

Following a detailed and independent review of an initial three-month trial, the trial was extended for a further year and we have continued to work in this way.

The idea of a four-day week at the Council is to improve services by filling hard-to-fill posts permanently, rather than relying on more expensive agency staff, which can also be disruptive. For example, when bin lorry drivers leave, it can disrupt collections when new drivers are learning bin routes or agency drivers cover them as replacements are trained. 11 lorry drivers left the Council in 2022, but only five did in 2023 after bin crews joined the four-day week trial.

We are now eager to hear about residents' experiences of our services during this way of working – which this consultation is allowing us to gather. Residents can also comment on the four-day week generally.

Our Lead Cabinet Member for Resources, Cllr John Williams, said:

"We'd really appreciate you taking the time to respond to this consultation. It's always been our plan to give residents, businesses, parish and town councils and community groups the chance to share their views with us. We want to understand your experiences of services you've received during our four-day week arrangements. So, we are very pleased to have now started that process. Our approach is designed to ensure those who have used our services during the four-day week arrangements can quickly and easily share their views - though anyone, anywhere is welcome to submit comments."

Your Council: Setting a vision for the years ahead

Just after your South Cambs Magazine went to print, District Councillors were setting our new priorities and next year's budget.

It's after we asked you to help shape our plans for the years ahead – to ensure South Cambridgeshire remains one of the best places to live and work in the country. Almost 400 responses were received during our six week consultation. That feedback helped develop our Corporate Plan for the next five years.

Our vision is for a fairer, kinder and greener South Cambridgeshire, where all residents will be equal partners in their communities. We aspire to create a better district to the benefit of everyone in our communities. We recognise the many challenges that face the district and will continue to work to overcome these to help realise its full potential.

Healthy and supported communities

Supporting and engaging with our communities is key to tackling the challenges we face as a district. Our diversity is our strength and helping everyone live freely and independently is essential to promoting healthy and supported communities.

Sustainable homes and vibrant places

A home is more than a roof over your head, it is the foundation on which people build their lives. An affordable home is essential for people to live happy, fulfilling lives. In light of the housing crisis, we are committed to strengthening our communities by delivering sustainable, affordable homes and vibrant places to live.

Helping businesses to thrive in South Cambridgeshire

Already recognised as a nationally significant area for development, helping local businesses thrive is key to the development of our district - bringing new jobs and opportunities into people's communities.

Being green to our core

Being green is at the heart of everything we do. We're tackling the climate and ecological crises head-on, ensuring our district is ready for the challenges of climate change.

Financially secure and fit for the future

We have a duty to provide high quality cost-efficient services. Being open, transparent, and inclusive and letting evidence guide our decisions is critical to putting residents first.

Our Lead Cabinet Member for Resources, Cllr John Williams, said:

"We're proud of how we've managed our finances through the years. It continues to be challenging due to increasing demand for our services coupled with reduced funding. It's a fantastic result for residents that independent reports have described us as a financially-sound Council. However, it's important to remember we only retain a very small amount of the Council Tax we collect. Most of it gets passed on to other authorities – and we continue to do all we can to make the most of every pound we receive."

Looking back

As we work to set our aspirations for the years ahead, we've also taken stock of our achievements in recent years. Here's just a tiny snapshot of some of the things we're proud of.

- We have supported numerous markets around the district and now have 14 markets that run regularly throughout the year. This includes our own Christmas Market, which has hosted 240 traders since 2021 and attracts up to 1,500 visitors annually.
- We allocated Government grants to support local businesses, communities and the local economy, including £876,000 from the Rural England Prosperity Fund and £200,000 to help rejuvenate high streets.

- · We've delivered nearly 400 new Council homes since April 2020.
- Since late 2022, we have brought 38 empty homes back into use.
- We have reduced emissions from our operations and estate by 22% from 2018/19 levels.
- We've provided funding to help communities respond to the climate and ecological emergencies, including £625,000 through our Zero Carbon Communities grants.
- In late 2024 we launched 'SAM', our artificial intelligence website assistant. In its first 25 days it received 1,152 requests - of which 87% were successfully responded to.
- We've delivered the Temporary Community Centre and Sports Pavilion at Northstowe. Plans have also been approved for Northstowe's Permanent Community Centre and building work starts very soon.
- We have supported 1,785 people with cost-of-living assistance.
- We have supported 937 guests through the Homes for Ukraine scheme among the highest in the country for a District Council.

Balancing the budget

We charge one of the lowest Council Taxes in the country to provide services to residents and businesses. Most of the Council Tax we collect is passed to Cambridgeshire County Council, Cambridgeshire Police, Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue Service and parish or town councils. Some is also passed to the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority, to support local buses.

Less than half of our annual budget is funded from local Council Tax. Our other funding sources include some outside of our control, such as Business Rates and grants, whilst funding is also generated from our investments. A £5.09 per year increase in Council Tax for the average band D home was due to be discussed by councillors as we went to print. This would help to ensure essential frontline services continue to be delivered effectively.

This would mean the average band D home charge for South Cambridgeshire District Council would become £175.40 per year. We expect that this would still maintain our position among the lowest 25% of taxing District Councils in the country.

Recycling and waste: The blue bin recycling journey

The materials you carefully clean, squash or flatten at home, then put into your blue bin, are on a recycling journey

The first destination for your recycling is a Materials Recycling Facility, or MRF for short, where all your metal cans, glass, paper and plastics are sorted and separated, mainly by machinery like magnets and infra-red sensors.

Materials are then pressed into bales and ready to be traded. UK buyers are prioritised. Last year all materials we sent for recycling, except for 38% of paper and card, were sold on to UK based recyclers. Some materials like paper are transformed into new products at their first destination, being pulped and pressed into reels of paper for newsprint, for example.

Others like metal, are melted down into ingots which are sold again to manufacturers who make anything from aeroplanes to cans.

From March this year, there is a change in the journey your recycling takes. For the last ten years it has been dropped off by our bin lorries at a MRF in Waterbeach. However, that contract expired, and following a procurement process bound by public sector rules, a new company was appointed. The company that runs the Waterbeach site was not successful so there had to be a change.

Importantly, the result of the tender means no changes to what you put into your blue bin. The new contract was awarded to Re-Gen Waste Ltd which has a MRF in Newry, Northern Ireland. Initially, this is where your blue bin recycling will be taken. One of Europe's most advanced MRFs, it runs on 100% renewable energy and has specialist machinery.

Re-Gen has also told us that, in the first half of this year, it will take over a MRF on the mainland. This will then negate the need to transport the recycling to Northern Ireland.

Re-Gen also has more effective sorting which means better recycling options. For example, it is now possible for 95% of glass to be re-melted and used for new bottles and jars, rather than most being used in road construction.

The new contract does involve further haulage by road than previously. But Re-Gen has an extensive haulage operation transporting both unsorted recycling from 16 councils in England to their MRF, as well as sorted materials from their MRF to recycling companies around the UK. They are using empty space in their lorries returning to their MRF to transport our material.

Like our own Greater Cambridge Shared Waste service, Re-Gen is transitioning its fleet of vehicles to more sustainable fuels like Hydrotreated Vegetable Oil and trialling electric trucks within the first year of our contract.

Our Lead Cabinet Member for Environmental Services, Cllr Natalie Warren-Green, said:

"Materials collected for recycling are part of a global economy. There are carbon emissions at every stage of waste re-use. With the change of contract, the impacts of transport changes will be monitored and considered in the round with the wider impacts of processes used for recycling your waste metals, plastics, glass, paper and cardboard."

Recycling and waste: Exciting upgrades coming to Milton's Household Recycling Centre

Later this year, construction will begin on a state-of-the-art Household Recycling Centre (HRC) in Milton, designed to make recycling and reuse easier, safer, and more convenient for residents.

Cambridgeshire County Council's new facility will be built on the existing site and adjacent land at Butt Lane. With a larger area and a modern design, the upgrades will focus on accessibility, safety, and sustainability.

What's new for residents?

- A split-level design, eliminating the need to climb steps to dispose of waste.
- A new reuse shop to give items a second life.
- Additional car parking and a cycle parking area.
- A separate gate for safe pedestrian access.
- · A layout that improves safety by keeping site users separate from operational vehicles.

Opening hours for the new site will remain the same.

With South Cambridgeshire's growing population, including plans for 11,000 new homes at nearby Waterbeach, this expanded facility will ensure convenient recycling and waste disposal for years to come.

Cambridgeshire County Council will introduce a new temporary online booking system for Thriplow, Witchford, and Bluntisham sites when the Milton site is temporarily closed.

Timeline and temporary changes

- Construction is due to start in autumn 2025 and will take around nine months.
- A temporary closure of the Milton site is expected but this will be kept as brief as possible.

 During this period, residents can use nearby centres at Thriplow, Witchford, and Bluntisham.

 To make visits easier, Cambridgeshire County Council will introduce a new temporary online booking system for these three sites only, if the Milton site is closed. This real-time system will reduce queues and wait times, allowing residents to schedule visits at their convenience, including on the same day. For those without internet access, bookings will also be able to be made over the phone.

Cambridgeshire County Council is working closely with the contractor, Barnes Construction, to minimise disruption and the duration the site is closed for.

The new centre will help to contribute towards the County Council's vision of a greener, fairer and more caring Cambridgeshire.

Communities: Greener paths ahead: Safer, greener travel for communities on Greenways

Getting around South Cambridgeshire is becoming easier, greener, and safer, thanks to Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) Greenways projects.

These routes are designed to help residents, businesses, and visitors walk, cycle, ride and wheel between towns, villages, and Cambridge with less stress and improvements to safety. Here's what's on the horizon for 2025.

The Barton Greenway is set to take a big step forward this year. Works on Barton Road completed last year, which included 1.3km of temporary footpath and ducting for new utilities being laid, mean construction to upgrade and widen the existing path for safer, smoother journeys is expected to begin in March. New features in Barton village, like raised crossings and a 20mph speed limit, will make it safer for everyone – especially schoolchildren heading to Barton Primary School.

In Fulbourn, work on Phase 1 – linking the village to Yarrow Road – is scheduled to start this year. Meanwhile, planning continues for Phases 2 and 3, which will reach Cambridge Railway Station. These routes will mean fewer cars on the roads and safer, quieter school runs for local families. Residents can expect smoother, low-traffic paths connecting them to shops, schools and more.

The Linton Greenway will also see progress. With the first sections already complete, 2025 will bring new design options for an improved footbridge over the A11, making it easier and safer for pedestrians and cyclists to cross, as well as designs for the remaining sections.

In Sawston, plans are moving forward for better-lit paths, upgrades to the DNA route, and safer roads through Stapleford and Great Shelford. Designs should be finalised by spring. These changes will create safer, better connected villages for everyone.

And in Melbourn, the first improvements are already in use, including a newly widened and resurfaced path linking Meldreth Station to Station Road. This year, the focus will be on safer walking and cycling routes through Melbourn and Meldreth and improving links to places like Shepreth, ensuring everyone has a secure way to get to their destination.

Cambridgeshire County Cllr Elisa Meschini, Chair of the GCP, said:

"These projects are about more than infrastructure. They're about building a greener, healthier future for all of us. Upgrades in Comberton, Horningsea, Melbourn and Linton have already made it safer for people to move around the local area — and progress will continue at pace in 2025."

Communities: New charity offers free bikes and workshops to support communities

The Liberation Cycle is a new charity that rescues bikes destined for landfill and revamps them before giving them for free to people in need across the region.

The charity provides free reconditioned bicycles and bike servicing to individuals facing financial hardship or critical illnesses. These bikes, delivered free of charge, often become vital lifelines for accessing community services.

The charity is based in the Community Workshop in Ashwell Road, Steeple Morden, but supports people living across Cambridgeshire, Bedfordshire and Hertfordshire.

Antonio Mariconda, the founder, set up The Liberation Cycle after being inspired by how bikes helped his immigrant father integrate into his new community and supported him emotionally and physically after losing his wife, Clare, to cancer.

The charity addresses a significant environmental issue, repurposing some of the 15 million bikes discarded annually. Donated bikes from Thalia and Cambridgeshire County Council's Household Recycling Centres form the backbone of this effort.

The charity also runs community workshops under two flagship projects:

- The Regeneration Cycle: Participants dismantle bikes, learn mechanical basics, and contribute to the charity's parts store, fostering skill-building and social interaction.
- The Labour Swap Cycle: Volunteers repair bikes for beneficiaries while gaining advanced mechanical skills to service their own.

With the help of a grant of almost £1,700 from our Community Chest fund, there are plans to hold 192 workshops annually, including sessions for schools, retirees, and families. The Liberation Cycle aims to engage 10 volunteers per session and become the UK's top bikefocused support organisation.

Cllr Henry Batchelor, our Lead Cabinet Member for Communities, said:

"We are proud to support the incredible work of The Liberation Cycle through our grant funding. Their efforts in refurbishing bicycles and providing them to individuals and families who might not otherwise be able to afford one is a testament to their commitment to building a more inclusive, active, and sustainable community. Access to bikes can transform lives, enabling better mobility, health, and opportunities for all.

Communities: More ways to get around

A third of UK households own two or more cars or vans, and car numbers on our roads are continuing to increase. Owning an electric car is a greener way to travel, but there are several other cheaper transport options to consider, which are particularly important for those unable to drive.

Active travel methods such as cycling and walking are not only good for your health but bring with them the bonus of being free. For those travelling further afield, e-bikes are becoming increasingly popular, with many workplaces (including ourselves) encouraging employees, to consider their benefits.

Car-sharing schemes such as 'Liftshare' are worth investigating, particularly when commuting to a regular destination. Simply add your journey to a matching database and filter your search to find the best lift share for you!

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Whereas traditional bus services allow you to catch a bus from a designated bus stop at various scheduled times throughout the day, Demand Responsive Transport (DRT) can offer a more flexible option. DRT is a particularly attractive option in rural areas where traditional bus routes may not be viable.

Tiger On Demand is a new DRT service, allowing users to book bus journeys between designated virtual bus stops within specific zones. Operating Monday to Saturday from 6:30am to 7pm, this flexible and affordable service has been designed to fill critical gaps in public transport, making it easier for people to access work, education, healthcare, and social opportunities. Tiger On Demand is available across South Cambridgeshire, East Cambridgeshire, Fenland and West Huntingdonshire, offering improved connectivity for rural and underserved areas.

Two trainlines operate in the district:

Govia Thameslink Railway runs from Cambridge to London King's Cross via Foxton, Shepreth and Meldreth and to King's Lynn via Waterbeach.

Greater Anglia runs from Cambridge to London Liverpool Street via Shelford and Whittlesford Parkway.

Community transport in South Cambridgeshire plays a vital role in connecting residents who do not have their own transport and cannot easily access public transport. These services, primarily operated by voluntary and community sector organisations, offer essential mobility solutions, particularly for older adults, individuals with disabilities, and those in isolated rural areas. This brings with it enormous social and economic benefits. This includes combating loneliness and social isolation, helping people remain independent and allowing them to access services.

Community transport includes:

Dial-A-Ride services: Wheelchair-accessible minibuses and cars providing door-to-door transport. Royston and District Community Transport serves Royston and surrounding South Cambridgeshire villages, Huntingdon Association of Community Transport serves the villages towards the Huntingdon side of South Cambridgeshire, Cambridge Dial-a-Ride serves Milton, Sawston, Bar Hill, Girton, Cottenham, Histon and Impington and The Voluntary Network serves Linton, West Wickham, Great Wilbraham, Weston Colville, Carlton, West Wratting, Horseheath, Castle Camps, Weston Green, Abington and Balsham.

Hospital transport: In general, patients are responsible for getting themselves to and from non-urgent NHS appointments. NHS Cambridgeshire funds patient transport in certain circumstances. For example, where the patient's medical condition is such that they require the skills and support of Patient Transport Services staff. Transport is arranged through your GP surgery and is subject to eligibility.

Community car schemes: Run by volunteer drivers coordinated at the village level, these schemes operate across the district and charge passengers a per-mile rate, ensuring affordability. If a scheme does not cover a particular parish, neighbouring schemes may be able to assist, though additional mileage costs might apply. Care Network Cambridgeshire collaborates with the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority to support the establishment of new community car schemes. Individuals or groups interested in setting up a scheme can reach out to Care Network Cambridgeshire on 01954 211919.

Taxi Card scheme: This is aimed at those aged 65 or over who live in Papworth Everard, Fen Ditton, Horningsea, Teversham, Fulbourn, Girton, Grantchester, Histon, Impington, Oakington, Sawston, Cambourne and Babraham. Journeys need to be mainly for essential purposes such as medical appointments or shopping.

Moped and mobility scooter hire: For example, Shopmobility schemes that can lend manual wheelchairs and powered scooters to members of the public who might have limited mobility when they shop or visit leisure and other facilities within the town.

Cambridge Dial-a-Ride is a non-profit organisation offering accessible transport for individuals aged 16+ in Cambridge and nearby villages who face difficulties using public transport due to disability, infirmity, or age. The service operates on weekdays, providing travel for medical appointments, shopping, social visits, and more, including outings to destinations beyond Cambridge. Minibuses are equipped with lifts for wheelchairs, and drivers assist passengers door-to-door. Membership costs £15 annually, and fares apply for each journey. Journeys must be booked in advance via phone, with flexible pick-up times to accommodate other passengers. For more information call 01223 506335 or email

Communities: Court experience day to educate students about risks of knife crime

The South Cambs Community Safety Partnership, led by our Council colleagues, took groups of year nine students to a local court for Knife Crime Awareness Days during November 2024, and early this year.

Based on a package designed by East Cambridgeshire's Community Safety Partnership, we made use of Ely Magistrate's Court to give students the experience of being in a real courtroom. They role-played a bag search under suspicion of carrying a knife, a police interview, and a subsequent court session.

The day also involved a presentation around the risks of carrying knives – including that the knife could be used against you, as well as the impact that being prosecuted for carrying a knife without a valid reason can have on future job and travel prospects. We also covered how having a knife makes you more likely to injure someone in a way that will do lasting harm to not only them, but also you and your future and the impact on loved ones.

We were joined by Quinton Green from Music Mentoring Arts and Poetry Workshops, who led the students in thinking about their aspirations and having positive future goals to guide their decisions, including how influences of games and social media can desensitise us to violence and lead to fears of knife-carrying being more common than it is.

Police colleagues also joined us and gave the students a question and answer session with insights into their work, as well as a Magistrate to lead us through the court role-play, all to inspire young people towards possible careers in policing, and legal and court roles.

Planning: Award winning Service celebrates a successful year

Our Greater Cambridge Shared Planning Youth Engagement Service (YES) were delighted to attend the annual Network CB23 Primary School Careers Convention last year.

This convention is one of the many outreach projects which the YES team take part in and was an opportunity to encourage over 500 primary school students from the Greater Cambridge region, aged between 10 and 12, to consider pursuing careers in the built and natural environment professions, and to learn about the basics of placemaking and citizenship.

Our YES team gave useful advice on the subjects that they need to study at GCSE, A-Level and university to obtain relevant qualifications to become a town planner, urban designer, architect, landscape architect, arboriculturist, heritage specialist and ecologist. Children also learnt about the basics of placemaking through fun games and quizzes.

The team also ran an in-person survey with over 350 children to understand what they considered important in terms of our priorities. It generated useful qualitative and quantitative data to help plan community facilities for our youth population.

Cllr Dr. Tumi Hawkins, our Lead Cabinet Member for Planning, attended October's convention and said:

"We are pleased that over 500 students have benefitted from our Youth Engagement Service. Throughout 2025, the YES team will continue regular work with schools and colleges in the district to engage local young people and obtain their views on development proposals in Greater Cambridge through our workshops. It aims to ensure that children and young people have genuine input into a development proposal, including the design of buildings, play spaces, public realm and public art."

Meanwhile, in January this year, the YES team proudly received the Social Value Award at the Thornton Education Trust Inspire Future Generations awards ceremony. The YES team were also finalists in six other award categories.

This came after work last summer, when the YES team engaged 60 Year 5 students from Bellbird Primary School in a Public Art Project; 'The Seed'. The partnership included local artist Harry Gray, Abstract Securities Ltd, Bowmer and Kirkland Ltd, Sphere25 and Michael Laird Architects. It enabled students to take part in design workshops comprising a site visit, careers talk on art and architecture, a fun stone carving workshop and a design competition to draw a pattern for 'The Seed' - a 4 metre high Portland stone sculpture.

'The Seed' contains multiple slots - each student had the opportunity to design their own pattern in the form of a little 'stone' seed, which will be inserted into the main sculpture. This project was designed based on the 'YES Social Value Statement' and the 'Greater Cambridge Youth Engagement Framework', ensuring young people have a genuine input into public art and develop confidence to communicate their design ideas to adults.

Scott has travelled widely, working in Vancouver and New York, running a low and slow BBQ restaurant and obsessively checking out every diner, deli and corner joint from Brooklyn to the Bronx. The quirky neighbourhood restaurants and diversity of great tasting quick food helped shape his ideas for Scott's. Just like those cosy dives embedded in New York's avenues, Scott wanted to build a home-from-home for locals with friendly faces and comforting dishes.

"Cambridge is a great place for food right now, says Scott, and there are amazing suppliers in the countryside all around, but I reckon there's something more. Mill Road is our greatest food asset - tremendous ingredients from all over the world, a cosmopolitan crowd and a particular attitude I really recognise - a kind of feisty community pride".
